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the Vice-Chancellor's Desk

It gives me great pleasure to place before you a gist of the exchange of views we had at the Canada-India Education Summit – 2011 held in Ottawa, Canada from 16th to 18th June 2011. The Summit was a sequel to the visit to that country by the distinguished Prime Minister of India, Dr Manmohan Singh. As the Ambassador of India to Canada, His Excellency Shri S M Gavai mentioned it in his address, the objective of the Summit was to touch upon the core issues of bi-lateral academic collaborations between the two countries, all meant to produce trained workforce to attain high economic growth and also to achieve inclusive growth, a vital component



of a vibrant democracy. This "conclave of knowledge heads" sought a "symbiosis and synergy" of efforts to meet the challenges of capacity building and to usher in an era of internationalization of university campuses with a mutuality that reinforces each other's strengths, as two great democracies come together in this enterprise. This is how Prof. Sunaina Singh, President, Shastri Indo-Canadian Institute, New Delhi, a bi-national organization, described the event. Shrimati D. Purandheswari, Hon'ble Union Minister of State for HRD, Government of India, the Chief Guest at the Summit, aptly said knowledge is truth and truth liberates (veritas vos liberabit) and against this backdrop she unfolded a vision and perspective on education from the primary to the tertiary levels emphasizing the fact that equity and access were the cornerstone of the educational philosophy of India, Prof. Ved Prakash, Chairman, University Grants Commission, in his well-illustrated address on "The Changing Dynamics of Higher Education in India," which gave a precise summing up and assessment of the higher educational scenario in the country, touched upon the vision and mission, status, financing, challenges, and reforms in the field and focused on the challenges of innovation, privatization, entry of foreign universities, and internationalization which higher education has to meet.

With the re-emergence of Asia taking place at a rapid pace in the economic sector and also in the field of higher education, one of the questions that engaged the attention of the Summit was the development of the architecture of durable relations between India and Canada in which some of the important components could be educational connectivity with technology acting as a bridge and a consortium of eminent minds attempting, among other things, a documentation of the best practices to be shared among universities in India and Canada. In this common pursuit of collaborations, adapting collaborations to national contexts is of vital importance. Then the turning out of internationally marketable products and the widening of their horizons to enable an outlook of global thinking are another area of concern.

In this context, the thoughts generated by a book published in the U.S are worth bearing in mind. Academically Adrift, authored by Richard Arum, Josipa Rosca finds American Universities full of "drifting dreamers" with high ambitions no doubt but with no clear life plan for reaching them. This trend of the drift seems to be universal but that is indeed no matter of consolation for us in India. The book finds that a large number of students from out of a sample of 2,222 felt they learned little or nothing in the universities. More than a third showed no improvement in their skills. Apart from getting the credentials for it, for many higher education seemed a waste of time. The students were tested in critical thinking, complex reasoning, and writing skills. The gains in these areas were found empirically non-existent. What is more, students and professors have a disengagement agreement - a mutual understanding that "I'll leave you alone, if you leave me alone." These same propositions / questions / challenges are to be squarely addressed in the Indian classroom by a common pursuit in which we are motivated to resolve the theory-praxis ambivalence.

This transfer has formally completed the bringing in of the UG, PG, and Professional courses being offered by 127 colleges hitherto affiliated to Sri Venkateswara University now falling in the jurisdiction of Vikrama Simhapuri University, Nellore. Prof. N. Prabhakar Rao, Vice-Chancellor, S.V. University, Tirupati, handed over the letters of transfer to Prof. C.R. Visweswara Rao, Vice-Chancellor, V. S. University, Nellore. Prof. C.R. Visweswara Rao, talking on the occasion said that the transfer of S.V.U P.G Centre, Kavali, has further strengthened the higher education initiatives of the Government which is committed to rural empowerment and creating new opportunities for the rural youth.

The PG Centre at Kavali came into being in 1973 under the Visvodaya Trust with two courses, namely, Economics and Commerce. Now the PG Centre has **12 PG courses** out of which 5 courses are regular and 7 courses are self-supporting. There are 20 regular members of the faculty supported by guest faculty and teaching assistants and also with a support staff of 140. The PG Centre is in a sprawling campus of 79 acres and has 11 buildings with an infrastructure of 5 crores. The Laboratories are well-furnished and the Central Library houses good number of titles, references, journals and volumes.

I & III Semester PG results released

First semester of M.Sc (Chemistry), M.A (English), M.Sc (Marine Biology), MCA and Third semester MBA, MCA, M.A English, M.Sc. (Organic Chemistry), M.Sc. (Marine Biology) PG results of Vikrama Simhapuri University were formally released by the Vice-Chancellor, Prof. C.R. Visweswara Rao at the Administration Block, Dargamitta on 17th May 2011.

Cent percent result in the First semester was recorded in M.Sc (Chemistry) and M.A (English), while 80% and 77.7% were recorded in M.Sc (Marine Biology) and MCA respectively. The total aggregate of the First semester results stood at 86.67%.

The Third semester results are encouraging since cent per cent results were recorded in MCA, M.A (English), M.Sc (Organic Chemistry), M.Sc (Marine Biology) while MBA recorded 94.1% with the total aggregate standing at 91.69%. Of the 164 students appearing for III semester examinations, 160 students passed and of the 90 students appearing for I semester examinations 78 students passed. Girl students fared well in the overall tally.

Talking on the occasion, the Vice-Chancellor said that it is yet another bright academic year from the point of view of the pass percentages of the students. Prof. V. Narayana Reddy, Registrar was with the Vice-Chancellor at the release of the results. Dr. Ch. Venkatrayulu, Coordinator, Examinations, the staff of the Examination Section were present when the results were released.

VSU for a revamp of academic process in B.Ed. Colleges

Falling in linewith the affiliation process, the University is taking effective steps in revamping the academic process and the conduct of the examinations at every level. A meeting with the Correspondents and Principals of the B.Ed colleges affiliated to the University was conducted in the Seminar Hall of the University on **21**st **April 2011**, attended by the Correspondents and Principals of 20 B.Ed colleges. Prof. V. Narayana Reddy, Registrar, the Chief Guest at the meeting made an overall review of the academic process of the colleges during the last academic year.

He was specific with reference to the appointments in the colleges and stressed that every college Management should take steps to appoint the Principal and teachers on regular basis through a selection process in the ratio of 1:7. Referring to updating the teaching-learning process, he said that the colleges should focus on providing the students with the latest technical aids like using LCD projects and OHPs for making the teaching process more effective and enlightening.

V-C's APPEAL FOR FOOLPROOF CONDUCT OF UG EXAMINATIONS



In the wake of the First Year B.A., B.Com., B.Sc., Examinations to be conducted by Vikrama Simhapuri University, the Vice-Chancellor, Prof. C.R. Visweswara Rao, convened a meeting of the Managements and Principals of UG Colleges on 11th February 2011 for a fair, smooth, and transparent conduct of the examinations to be held from 23th March 2011 to 13th April 2011. He said that the University adopted ICR formats bar coding system for the answer scripts. One of the objectives of this meeting is to acquaint the Principals with some of these technical modalities. He sought the cooperation of the Principals and the Managements of the colleges for the smooth conduct of the examinations. The examinations were conducted in 35 centres and 8975 students registered for the UG examinations. VSU – UG results

Transparency and fairness got the better off



The First year Degree UG results of Vikrama Simhapuri University were released on 09-06-2011 at 4:00 pm in the University Administration Building. The UG examinations conducted from 23-03-2011 to 13-04-2011 are of special mention since the examinations were conducted by the University in the aftermath of the conferment of affiliation on 09th April 2010. Vice-Chancellor, Prof. C.R.Visweswara Rao said that the examinations were conducted in a foolproof manner. The overall pass percentage this year is 31.85%. The highest pass percentage was recorded in BCA (Bachelor of Computer Applications) with 89.5% while B.A recorded the lowest pass percentage wth 12.75%. B.Sc, course for which 4664 students appeared got 33.9% pass percentage with 1583 students clearing the boards. B.Com, the second largest preferred course with 3242 students appearing for the examinations got 31.34% with only 1016 students securing the pass marks. Pre-Degree course attended by 12 students got 75% result with 9 students securing the pass percentage. B.B.M got 54.41% with 68 students appearing for the examinations and 60 students getting the pass percentage. On the whole 8802 students appeared for the examinations and 2804 students passed making the overall percentage 31.85% this year.

Prof. V. Narayana Reddy, Registrar, said that the University has given considerable priority for the conduct of UG examinations. Sitting Observers were appointed with the faculty drawn from the colleges and the sister universities to keep tabs on malpractices and to oversee the examination process. Three High Power Committees were constituted to reaffirm the quality commitment of the University.

DST National Workshop on Mathematical Modelling in GIS Applications Promoting all round welfare through GIS: Surveyor General

"Geographical Information Systems (GIS) has the potential to promote all round human welfare and development," said Sri Swarna Subba Rao, the Surveryor General of India, inaugurating the five-day Department of Science and Technology sponsored National Workshop on *Mathematical Modelling in Geographical Information Systems Applications*, 26-29 March 2011. He said that 678000 results are developed for Natural Resource Modeling for atmospheric dispersion. Explaining the changed scenario in surveying and mapping from manual operations to digitization, he said that they are presently occupied with designing 125000 maps on 1:10000 scale. He said that GIS software is to integrate spatial data and attribute data to give accurate mapping and evaluation. In his talk he explained the Digital Elevation Models in hydrological applications and Tsunami prediction.

Prof. C.R. Visweswara Rao, Vice-Chancellor, Vikrama Simhapuri University, presiding over the function, dwelt on the multi-faceted and multi-dimensional utility of GIS. He focused on the relevance of Computer Science in analyzing user friendly data and the development of search engines for spatial data. Keeping in view the immense job potential, the University proposed to start an M.Sc course in GIS under the aegis of the DST. "The proposal is under active consideration of the DST," he said.
